ill had loving adoptive parents and was nervous about the challenge of reconnecting with her birth family. Would they talk to her? Would they accept her? Would they be disappointed?

After years of weighing her options and with constant support from her husband, Jill decided it was time to discover where she came from despite many questions and fears. LSS/NCA conducted her adoption decades before so Jill contacted us in hopes of opening her file and connecting with her birth parents.

After months of returned letters and failed internet searches, LSS/NCA staff received one hopeful response from a woman, Tonya, who claimed to be Jill's sister. Tonya explained that her mother had passed away but always talked about a daughter who was placed for adoption the same year Jill was born. Tonya grew up knowing she had a big sister and even helped her mother search for Jill on several occasions. Tonya was able to provide additional information to our staff ensuring that she was indeed Jill's biological sister.

Last month, we received the following email from Jill's husband:

"Good morning! I wanted to share a couple of videos and pictures with you involving my wife Jill and the reunion with her sister..."

He explained that after LSS/NCA staff located Jill's sister in South Dakota, the two sisters talked (and talked and



talked). They instantly connected. About a week later, Jill's husband contacted Tonya and conspired a top-secret plan to help the two meet on Jill's birthday. He surprised them both with a "girls' weekend" that turned out to be an emotional and wonderful reunion.

"...I planned a weekend full of pampering: massages, manicures and pedicures (like sisters do), a day at Universal Studios (Tonya had never been to a big park like that) and finally on Sunday, I organized a brunch for just the women of our family to meet Tonya. Words can't describe how happy they are - due in very large part to LSS/NCA."

The sisters remain connected and have introduced one another to their extended family members.

Moments and stories like this demonstrate the LSS/NCA mission of creating families and offering hope.

Refugee Arrivals Increasing Each Month:

Volunteers, Mentors, and In-Kind Drives are Crucial

t the beginning of our fiscal year, the government told us to expect to serve about 600 refugees between October 2015 and September 2016. By the end of December, we had served nearly 269 refugees, almost half of the total 12-month estimate! Recently, the government readjusted their initial estimate and has asked us to plan for roughly 900 arrivals, 50 percent more than previously expected.

These arrivals consist of families and individuals generally from Afghanistan, Iran, and Iraq. Often times these refugees are Special Immigrant Visa (SIV) holders, meaning they are highly educated and held professional careers in their country of origin: professors, interpreters, engineers, etc.

As a result of their assistance to the United States and our troops overseas, extremists have threatened their lives. Thus, many have had to make the difficult decision to leave home. These refugees are eager to begin new careers in our community where they will be able to apply their foreign accredited education and expertise, but this will take time. They usually spend their initial months in America in the first job they can find in order to provide for their family.

As in every case, all of our newly arriving families and individuals will need housing, furniture, linens, toiletries, mentoring, assistance in finding employment, and friendship as they rebuild their lives in a new and foreign country. Given the

high number of arrivals in the past few months and the many more expected to join our community in the coming year, your partnership and support is paramount to delivering the comprehensive services our neighbors need to gain self-sufficiency as quickly as possible. Every in-kind donation, volunteer, back-to-school drive, and Thanksgiving meal is a blessing to our families.

LSS/NCA clients were guided through a one-hour presentation that emphasized the details of an effective résumé, including the use of key words, the importance of grammar, and the value of proper résumé format and brevity. Empowered by the workshop, our new neighbors are now confidently navigating their employment search. Mr. King will continue working with our new refugee arrivals throughout the year.

"LETTING GO"

Mary Tyson has been a foster parent with LSS/NCA for 26 years and has fostered a total of 228 children. Below is her eloquent testament about the call to fostering and the requirement of "letting go."

etting Go...is one subject that comes up more than any other when I am talking to potential foster parents. They want to know how they will be able to "let go" when it is time for the child to leave. People say, "I could never foster a child because I would love them too much and would not be able to give them up."

Unfortunately, this heartbreak is built into the responsibility. Foster parents are asked to open their homes and their hearts. A foster family builds bonds of love and trust because that is what the child needs to heal from the trauma they have experienced in their lives. The foster family does this knowing that reuniting with the birth family is the best possible outcome for a foster child.

As with most things, this potential heartbreak is not easy to explain to those who have not experienced it. I "let go" of one of my kids today. After 6 months in our home, my emotions are a tangled ball of yarn as I begin the process of readjustment. However, there is another side to this heartbreak and this is the reality of taking in a stranger's child to provide the love they need. When I "let go" of a child the feelings are always two sided: Sadness and relief. Stress and freedom.

Fostering encourages us to reach deep inside ourselves and act outside of our own interests and comfort zone, to truly and fully love a child completely and without self-interest. When someone asks me how I handle the heartbreak of

sending a child home, I tell them that I am sad and I am happy. I will miss Johnny and I will cry over that loss. However, I will be happy that he is on a new path, on his way home. I pray to God that he will always be with him. "If it did not hurt to let you go, I did not do it right."

LSS/NCA's Support U programming for family caregivers concluded 2015 with high-energy "Crash Course" sessions in the District of Columbia. Stress around holiday times is compounded when a family member is aging or chronically ill. Members of Peace Lutheran Church, DC invited friends and community members to join in two Saturday morning courses full of helpful information and caring conversation. For the coming year, they will be reaching out to involve more participants and neighbors.

The Support U Crash Course covers six topics in two half-day sessions. The presentations and discussions

include: Planning Ahead, Finding and Using Resources, Self-Care for the Caregiver, Family Dynamics and Communication, Dementia and the Family, and Financial Wellness. Leaders for the Crash Course are volunteers who bring both professional skills and personal experience as caregivers within their own families.
