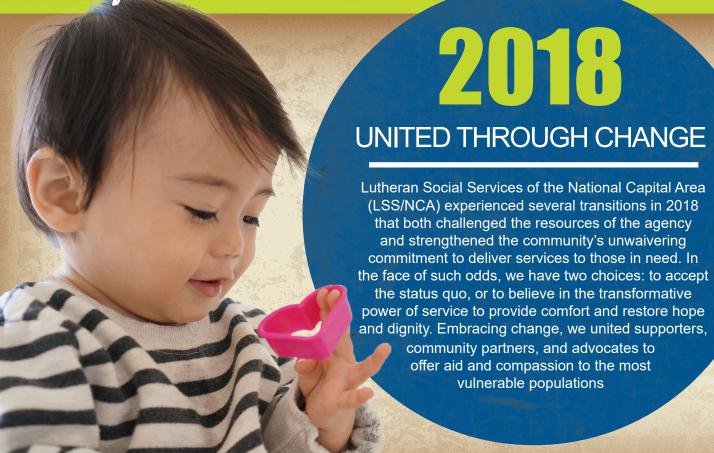

Letter From Leadership



2018: United Through Change

In 2018, LSS/NCA experienced a wave of unexpected transition. At the beginning of the year, the District of Columbia chose to deliver foster care services through one contract provider rather than the existing seven. This change in the D.C. foster care system eliminated LSS/NCA's traditional foster care program. At the same time, a series of executive orders discontinued the arrival of refugees for several months in 2018. In addition, presidential administrative priorities and national security reviews led to half the anticipated number of refugee arrivals expected. As a result of these limited government contracts and reduced funding, LSS/NCA expenses exceeded income in FY18, despite spending less than budgeted.

Although these changes disrupted the status quo, they reaffirmed our commitment to carry on through the obstacles and rallied others to our side. In response to these changes, LSS/NCA cut administrative costs, strengthened its grant revenue, and bolstered fee-for-service programming. Through partner collaboration, connected individuals, and a network of congregations, LSS/NCA continues to serve the most vulnerable populations. Just as it has done for over 100 years, LSS/NCA will continue to bolster services that meet the changing and unmet needs of our community.

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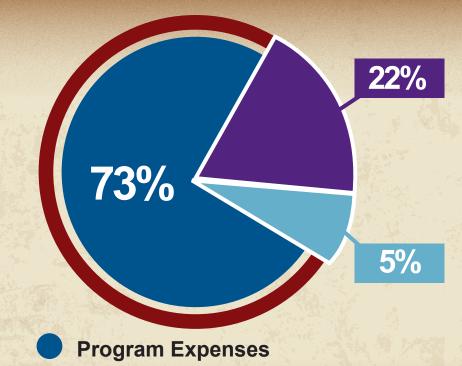

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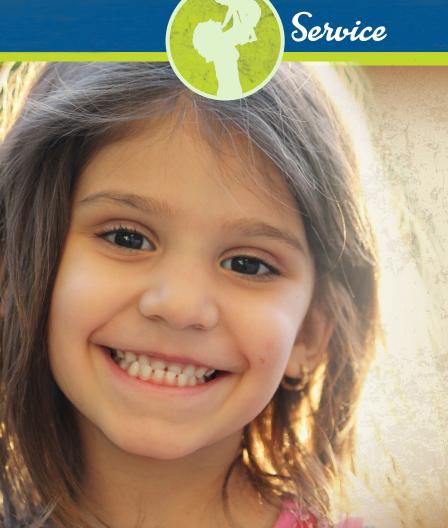
